Often as I drive across the bridge into La Center I try to imagine what the town looked like to its pioneer settlers. Of course La Center Road did not exist in the 1850's and it was another few decades before the town was plattted by John Timmens and began to take shape. There was no road between Vancouver and La Center in those days. Transportation was by foot or horseback over old Indian trails. River transportation was by canoe or bateau. In June of 1870 Mr. Arnold the owner of the Swallow is reported to have made the first trip up the East Fork of the Lewis River by steamboat. John Timmens built the first boat landing on the northwest shore. It was called Timmens Landing then and throughout the entire 20th century. Old timers still refer to the location by its name.

Timmens and his brother-in-law Andrew Brezee owned adjacent homestead claims on the north shore of the river in the area of the present day bridge. Main Street began at the river's edge with Timmen's property on the west and Brezee's on the east. Sternwheeler Captain William Weir built the first house along the banks of the river and also established a trading post nearby. He also purchased the Swallow and scheduled regular passenger service to Portland in 1872. La Center -- sometimes spelled "La Centre"-- soon gained fame as Clark County's inland port.





The first bridge - a long, wooden one - built by John Peterson and opened in 1883 is pictured on the left. Peterson later built a home on the hillside above Timmens Landing. It stood there for more than 100 years. The photogravure, "Photo by Heinst titled "Washington -- La Centre General View"-- appeared in *The West Shore* magazine's January 1888 edition.


In his recollections of the early days growing up in La Center, Pete Weir, Capt. Weir's son, reminisced: "La Center became a lively place due to the regular steamer service, the influx of settlers and the easy communication by water

from Portland. When the original long bridge was built across the river at the place used for steamboat landings, the people would use it for promenading and footracing. At these times, Woodland would send over their fleetest runners but La Center always won, as she had young men from Portland and other places who poured into town on all those occassions."

railroad ties to the East Fork where they were loaded on scows and sent to Portland. Timmens Landing was often jammed with water traffic. A photo below shows the sternwheelers Mascot and Governor Newell waiting to load or unload passengers and freight. The scow on the left awaits railroad ties for shipment to Portland. Dockside, also, were warehouses, a trading post, flour mill and ship building and repair services.


Logging Flumes on East Side

La Center's old Main Street ran in a northerly direction from the banks of the river as far as today's 4th Street. A variety of businesses lined both sides of the dirt road leading north. On the east side the River View Hotel, OK Barber Shop, Office Saloon and Livery were all built on stilts -- some as much 12 feet in height. Near the water's edge on the west side a two story building housed a mercantile on the first floor while the upper story was used by the Patrons of Husbandry who founded the first Grange in Washington in 1874. Adjacent to the mercantile in the south end was the Lewis River Post

Office and just a bit further north was Tom Headley's first blacksmith shop.

I have walked down the steps leading to Timmen's Landing -- and have also driven down the road past the sewage treatment plant, then under the bridge and parked at the boat landing -- to better envision La Center's historical footprints down by the riverside.

You might want to do the same sometime. Many pilings in the water serve as a reminder


